



BIOGRAPHICAL RESUME: STANLEY J. DUDRICK, MD, FACS

Born in Nanticoke, Pennsylvania, April 9, 1935, Stan Dudrick received his B.S. Cum Laude with Biology Honors in 1957 from Franklin and Marshall College. He was a Phi Beta Kappa honoree and was awarded the Williamson Medal. His M.D. degree was conferred by The University of Pennsylvania School of Medicine in 1961 followed by a rotating internship and General Surgery residency at the Hospital of the University of Pennsylvania, where he served as Chief Resident in Surgery under Dr. Jonathan E. Rhoads until 1967. He then joined the faculty at Penn and ascended to the rank of Professor of Surgery within five years. In 1972, he was recruited as the first Professor and Founding Chairman of the Department of Surgery at The University of Texas Medical School at Houston, Chief of Surgical Services at Hermann Hospital, and served on the Faculty of the M.D. Anderson Hospital and Tumor Institute. In 1988, he joined the staff of Pennsylvania Hospital, the nation's first hospital, in Philadelphia as Chairman of the Department of Surgery and Director of Surgical Education.

In 1994, he was appointed Professor of Surgery at Yale University School of Medicine and Director of the Program in Surgery at Saint Mary's Hospital in Waterbury, Connecticut. Yale granted him a Master of Arts Honoris Causa in 1999. Between 2000 and 2002, he also served as Chairman of the Department of Surgery and Director of Surgical Education for the newly integrated Bridgeport Hospital/Yale New Haven Health System. After five years as Chairman of the Department of Surgery at Saint Mary's Hospital, Dr. Dudrick assumed Chairman-Emeritus status in October, 2007, while continuing as Director of the Training Program in Surgery. He has served as Director-Emeritus of the Program in Surgery since July 1, 2008. Since 2008, he has served as Chairman of the Saunders Foundation for the Sick and Infirm of Naugatuck Borough. In January, 2011, he joined the Faculty of Misericordia University as the first occupant of the Robert S. Anderson, M.D. Endowed Chair, and Medical Director of the Physician Assistant Studies Program.

Certified by the American Board of Surgery, he served this distinguished organization continuously for 26 years as an Examiner, Director of the Board, and a Senior Board Member. He is a Fellow of the American College of Surgeons, and served as a Governor at Large from Texas from 1979-1985. He is also a Fellow of the American College of Nutrition and served as a member of their 21st Century Board. He currently is a member of the Board of Directors and Vice Chairman of the Certifying Board for Nutrition Specialists. He served as a member of the Board of Trustees of Franklin and Marshall College from 1985 to 2010, served as Vice Chairman for eight years, and was elected Emeritus Trustee in 2010. He has authored more than 800 published works, and has served on 15 Editorial Boards, including the *Annals of Surgery*. He is a member of more than 100 academic, honorary, professional and scientific societies, and he has been awarded 13 honorary fellowships and more than 100 other honors, including the First Flance/Karl Award of the American Surgical Association in 1997 and the prestigious American College of Surgeons Jacobson Innovation Award in 2005. He has been elected to Honorary Fellowship in the Polish Surgical Society in 2005; received the Association of Mexican Surgeons Lifetime Achievement Award in 2005; was elected to Honorary Fellowship in the Association of Colombian Surgeons in 2006; elected an Honorary Member of the National Academy of Medicine of Columbia, 2006. The Faculty of the School of Medicine of the University of Pennsylvania elected him the recipient of the Distinguished Graduate Award in 2007. In 2008, he was elected an Honorary member of the Mexican Academy of Surgery; granted Honorary membership in the Bohemian Medical Association of the Czech Republic; and received the Distinguished Service Award of the American College of Surgeons-Connecticut Chapter. In 2009, he received the American Surgical Association Medallion for Scientific Achievement for Distinguished Service to Surgery, the highest honor bestowed by the American Surgical Association. In 2010 he was invested by Misericordia University with the Honorary Degree of Doctor of Humane Letters. In June 2011, he served as the Gross Lecturer and Visiting Professor at Children's Hospital Boston, Harvard Medical School, and in September 2011, he received the Nathan Smith Award, for Distinguished Service to Surgery, from the New England Surgical Society. He has been on the Board of Directors of the Waterbury Symphony and has been cited as one of America's Top Surgeons continuously for the past 15 years. In 2012, the American College of Surgeons 100 Years of Surgical Quality Improvement cited him for "one of the most important advancements in surgery during the past century." He was also cited in 10 Philly Milestones in Surgical History as "an example of Philadelphia's leading role in healthcare where the first infant was kept alive nourished entirely long-term with intravenous feeding." The Stanley J. Dudrick Hospital was dedicated in 2012 in his honor in Skawina, Poland. In 2013, he was awarded the Honorary Degree of Doctor of Science by Franklin and Marshall College, and The University of Texas Health Science Center awarded him its highest medal and established the Annual Stanley J. Dudrick, M.D., Surgical Lectureship at the 40th Anniversary of the founding of the Medical School.

Dr. Dudrick is recognized throughout the world for his pioneering research in the basic investigative development and subsequent successful clinical application of the central venous feeding technique known as total parenteral nutrition (TPN), which has been acknowledged as one of the four most significant accomplishments in the history of modern surgery, together with the discovery and development of asepsis and antisepsis, antibiotic therapy, and anesthesia.

Stan and Theresa (Terry) have been married for 55 years, reside in Naugatuck, Connecticut and Eaton Center, New Hampshire and are the proud parents of two sons and four daughters; and the delighted grandparents of sixteen grandchildren.
