- Born Brooklyn, New York 1916 as only child of German Immigrants, John and Helen

- CHOP (1959) Professor of Pediatric Surgery
- CHOP (1971) Professor of Pediatrics
- CHOP (1946-81) Surgeon-in-Chief
- US Deputy Assistant Secretary for Health (1981)
- US 13th Surgeon General (1982-89)



- Pioneer and perfected pediatric surgical procedures
- 1957 separation of pygopagus(conjoined at pelvis) twins
- 1974 separation of ischiopagus(conjoined at spine) twins
- 17,000 inguinal hernia repairs
- 7,000 orchidopexies
- Many many other procedures



Koop later wrote that "each day of those early years in pediatric surgery I felt I was on the cutting edge. Some of the surgical problems that landed on the operating table at Children's had not even been named. Many of the operations I performed had never been done before. It was an exuberant feeling, but also a little scary. At times I was troubled by fears that I wasn't doing things the right way, that I would have regrets, or that someone else had performed a certain procedure successfully but had never bothered to write it up for the medical journals, or if they had I couldn't find it." - 1st Editor of Journal of Pediatric Surgery when it was founded in 1966.
- Wrote Sometime Mountains Move
- Koop Report on Abortion
- 1976 wrote The Right to Life, The Right to Die
- 1978 film Whatever Happened to the Human Race



- Abortion-opposed it on personal believes but felt it was a moral not public matter
- Tobacco- warning labels still in existence. He issued the challenge for the US to be a smoke free society by 2000
- AIDS- sex education, AIDS pamphlets, criticized on both sides
- Baby Doe Amendment- Down syndrome child with esophageal atresia allowed to pass away. 475 cases during his time at CHOP, no deaths in his last 8 years



- Died February 25, 2013 at the age of 96 at his home in New Hampshire
 - Philadelphia Inquirer "a courageous and brilliant pediatric surgeon who pioneered techniques ... and became an outspoken surgeon general".
